ARLYN COLBY

<u>Education</u> Eleva-Strum High School - 1962 UW-Eau Claire: Bachelor's - 1966 Western Michigan: Master's - 1970

Arlyn Colby impacted countless lives as a teacher, coach, mentor, author, community leader and friend.

Colby coached the Barron baseball team from 1975-2000. Over his 25-year coaching career, the Golden Bears won seven conference championships, three sectional championships (1977, 1979 and 1986) and a state title in 1979. Arlyn was inducted into the Wisconsin Baseball Hall of Fame in 1989.

Colby's influence extended beyond the baseball field. Arlyn made a difference in the lives of students as a math teacher and Key Club advisor. Over the years, many of Colby's past students reached their dreams as a result of his positive mentorship, encouragement and advice. Even after Arlyn retired from teaching, he continued mentoring youth in the Barron Area School District. He also served on numerous church, school and county committees.

In addition, Colby developed a deep passion for local railroad history. He wrote seven books that chronicled the history of railroads in Northwest Wisconsin. Colby also played a major role in preserving and reconditioning railcars, including a historical caboose at the Barron County Historical Society. As a result of Arlyn's hard work and unwavering passion, the history of local railroads will be remembered forever.

Arlyn's humble spirit and giving heart serve as an enduring inspiration for future generations.
