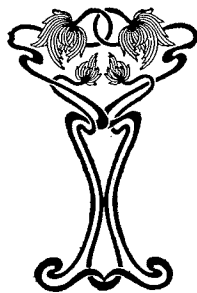
BARRON-39 GLENWOOD-0
