## THE SEASON

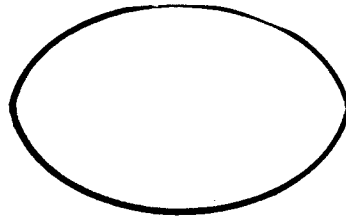
BARRON - 12    DURAND - 0

The 1956 Barron Bears football team opened their season on September 7 under the lights at Barron. Although the game was played in a driving rain, the Bears showed a strong offense and a stiff defense.

Dean Shaide scored the first touchdown midway in the first period on a run around left end. The try for point was missed and the score stood 6 - 0 for Barron. That was the count at the half.

It was Shaide again in the third quarter as he raced 30 yards to pay dirt to put Barron ahead 12 - 0. Once again the try for point was no good and the score remained 12 - 0.

The Bears, led by Shaide and Al Ormson penetrated fairly deep into Durand territory on several more occasions, but they were unable to score and the game ended 12 - 0 in favor of Barron.



BARRON - 0    BLOOMER - 26

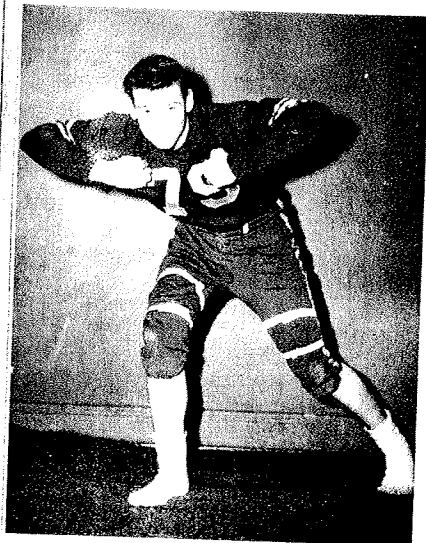
In the conference opener for both teams the Bears met the Bloomer Blackhawks at Memorial Field on September 14.

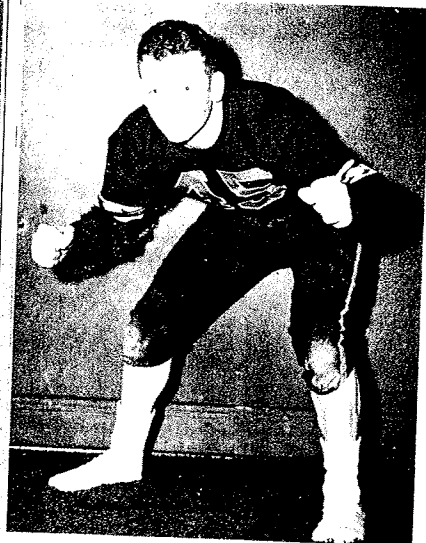

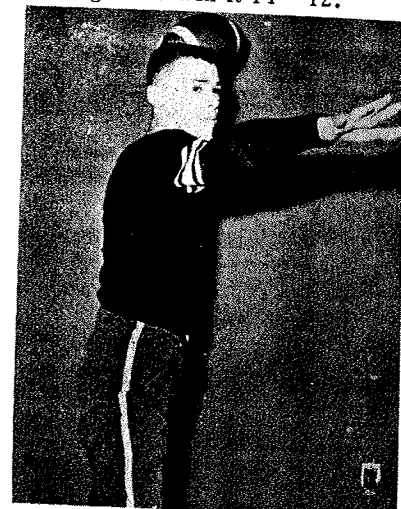

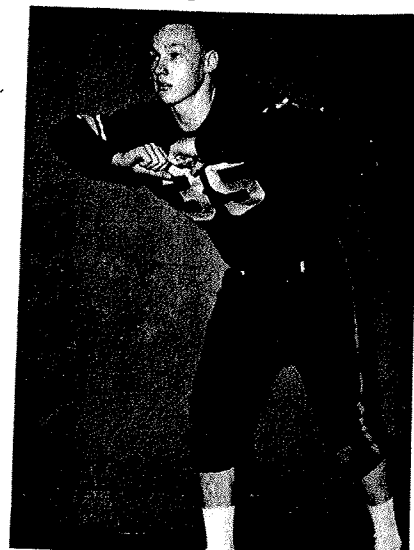

BARRON - 7 CUMBERLAND - 33

The Bears traveled to Cumberland on September 21 to take on the undefeated Beavers. The Beavers completely dominated the contest to win it easily, 33 - 7.

The lone Barron tally of the night came on a 15 yard run by Larry Stokes which culminated a 60 yard drive.

BARRON - 12 HAYWARD - 14

Barron lost a heartbreaker on September 28 before a large Homecoming crowd at Barron when a fumble in the final minutes of play paved the way to a 14 - 12 loss to Hayward.

Barron took a 12 - 0 halftime bulge. Both of Barron's first half touchdowns came on pass plays. Larry Stokes scored one and Jerry Bass scored one.

The Hurricanes started rolling in the third quarter. They scored once in the quarter to bring the score to 12 - 7 for Barron. Late in the final quarter, the Bears fumbled on their own 4 yard line and moments later Hayward scored again to win it 14 - 12.

BARRON - 19 LADYSMITH - 12

With Al Ormson leading the way with two touchdowns, our fighting Bears came through with their first conference victory on October 5 at Ladysmith.

The Bears scored on a 66 yard drive the first time they got their hands on the ball, with Dean Shaide making the tally. After the Jacks scored, Allen Ormson went over to give Barron a 12 - 6 lead at the half.

It was Ormson again in the second quarter as he raced 50 yards for a touchdown and also scored the extra point to gain a 19 - 6 advantage for the Bears. The last score of the night was Ladysmith's which made the final score; Barron - 19, Ladysmith - 12.

BARRON - 7 RICE LAKE - 27

The next Barron foe was Rice Lake who came to Memorial Field on October 12 and proceeded to crush the Bears 27 - 7. The only Barron touchdown was a 2 yard plunge by Allen Ormson.

Barron-0, Spooner-21

The Bears continued their losing ways on October 19 at Spooner as they closed out the 1956 Heart o' the North season by losing to the eventual conference champions 21-0.

Barron-45, Chippewa McDonnell-7

The 1956 Barron Bears closed out their season in a blaze of glory October 26 as they trampled McDonnell of Chippewa Falls 45-7 at Memorial Field.

The fireworks started early in the second quarter as Larry Stokes broke away and went 18 yards for the score to give the Bears a 6-0 edge.

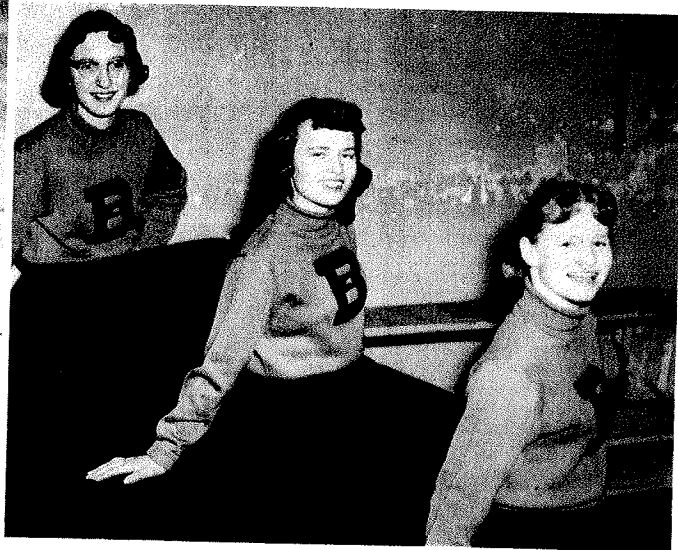
Minutes later Dean Shaide raced 30 yards for a touchdown and Allen Ormson plunged for the extra point to put Barron ahead 13-0. Later in the same quarter, Larry Lloyd passed to Roger Hover for 30 yards and another tally. Score: Barron-19, McDonnell-0. Still in the second quarter, Lloyd chucked to Hover again for 20 yards and another score to put Barron ahead 25-0 at the half.

The Bears continued the rout in second half on touchdowns by Hover, Larry Olson, and Shaide to run the final score to 45-7 for Barron.
