Mentor Spotlight: Doug Larson (Mentee: Evan)

Why is Doug the Spotlight Mentor?

Giving back to your community is a powerful way to make an impact, and Doug does just that through the Mentorship Program. Doug possesses many of the key qualities of a good mentor. He is kind, approachable, reliable and an active listener. He genuinely wants to make a difference in the life of a student!

What Evan says about the mentoring program:

I like the mentorship program because I think it gives students an opportunity to have another adult to talk to, get advice from, or get help from. I can have someone to talk about stuff that I may not want to talk to my parents or friends about. My mentor is someone who worked in a field that I am interested in working in the future. I can ask him questions about what he did to receive his training and what it was like while he was working in the field.

What inspired you to mentor?

I have had several mentors and have mentored a couple of younger people over my careers and have really enjoyed both sides of the experience. I didn't realize that BASD had an active mentor program until I was contacted about it last year after I retired from the power plant. It was a very easy decision for me to get involved with the program.

What is your favorite aspect of mentoring?

Getting to know people better and learning from them. I always learn something from a mentoring relationship, whether it be as a mentor or as a mentee. It's amazing to get fresh perspectives on things that I may have been mired in the past about!

Why do you think others should mentor?

Parents are awesome, but it's nice for kids to have an adult friend who is safe and accessible to talk to that isn't a parent. I think that most mentors really get a lot out of being a mentor. It's rewarding to establish a connection with your mentee and to know that you're helping someone navigate a difficult period of life. A lot of decisions are made during the teen years, and it's really cool to help someone make those decisions!



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Career Mentorships

Veterinary Technician

Here is what Mattie Whitehead, Senior at BHS, has to share about her job shadow with Northern Lakes Veterinary Clinic, Cumberland:

The job shadow was exactly as I pictured. Everyone was really nice and super kind to their patients and animals. There was a vet assistant I met there who went to New Richmond Northwood Tech, the school I applied for, and she was more than helpful telling me all about it. I enjoyed hearing the patients' opinions of self diagnosing about their animals compared to the doctor or vet techs's diagnosis. Usually the patients' opinions or self diagnosing is way off which makes it a joy to hear about and listen to. The job is absolutely perfect for the type of career I wanted. I know I didn't have the guts to physically do surgery on animals, but I wanted to help animals and make them get better. Being a vet tech was the perfect position in my opinion. For future students doing job shadowing, don't be scared to ask questions, go ahead and explore your surroundings. Don't stand in one spot, you won't get a feel of the experience. Don't forget to go in with the doctors to their appointments, I didn't know I could do that until I had two hours left of my job shadow, but I still had a blast and gained a lot of knowledge.

PROFICIENCY AWARD WINNER

Summer Hammann, class of 2024, recently wrapped up her high school FFA career as one of the top four FFA members in the

nation in dairy production! Summer was recognized as a National Proficiency Finalist in Dairy Entrepreneurship at the 2024 National FFA Convention in Indianapolis, IN. This award was the capstone to her outstanding high school FFA career, which included Career Development Events, SAE, and leadership achievements.



Proficiency Agricultural Awards honor FFA members who, through supervised agricultural experiences (SAEs), have developed specialized skills that they can apply toward their future careers. Students compete in areas ranging from agricultural communications to wildlife management. Proficiency awards are also recognized at local and state levels and provide recognition to members exploring and becoming established in agricultural career pathways. To compete in this award area, students must keep records of their SAE program over the course of their FFA membership and compile a yearly report documenting income and expenses, annual goal setting and reflection and documentation specific industry-related skills of learned. Proficiency award applications are submitted to the

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state FFA association each year, with the state winners competing Recognition. for National FFA Summer's program was named the Wisconsin FFA state winner in Dairy Entrepreneurship at the 2024 Wisconsin State FFA Convention. Her application was then forwarded to the national level, where she was selected as one of four FFA members nationwide to be recognized with this honor! All four finalists were then




interviewed by a panel of judges and were recognized on the Lucas Oil Stadium main stage at the National FFA Convention in late October 2024. This award included a prize of \$500 for being named a finalist.

In addition to the proficiency award programs, Summer earned her Wisconsin State FFA Degree and was named Wisconsin Star Farmer Finalist at the 2024 Wisconsin State FFA Convention in June. The Wisconsin State FFA Degree recognizes students' SAE program achievements and overall FFA involvement. State degree requirements include earning or investing \$1500 in a project or working in 1000 hours outside of class time, completing 25 hours of community service, participating in five FFA activities beyond the chapter level, presenting at least two ag-related speeches, and explanation of at least 10 industry related skills developed through their SAE project. Star Finalist candidates must complete additional documentation displaying

their knowledge and skills and reflections on project goals and accomplishments. The top ten candidates are then interviewed by a panel of judges to explain their projects. Finalists are recognized on stage at the Wisconsin FFA





Convention and earn prize money for their efforts.

Summer has also earned honors for her top skills in Dairy Cattle Evaluation. As a member of the Barron FFA Dairy Cattle Evaluation team, Summer led the team in regional qualifications at UW-UW-Platteville and qualified for the

Wisconsin State FFA Career Developments in April 2024; this marked her fourth consecutive year qualifying for state! Participants of this contest judge six classes of dairy cattle, present oral reasons, evaluate pedigrees, complete a linear evaluation of five dairy cattle, engage in sire selection exercises, and take a written exam on industry principles and competencies. The team placed in the top 10, and Summer was the state-winning individual out of 100 FFA contestants! Summer was recognized at the Wisconsin State FFA Convention for this honor. Additionally, Summer recently represented Wisconsin 4-H in the Dairy Cattle Evaluation contests at the North American International Livestock Exposition Louisville, Kentucky. at

Summer's love for the dairy industry started with growing up on her parents' sixty-five cow dairy farm,

Triple H Holsteins & Jerseys; Summer's parents are Scot and Becky Hammann. Summer's herd started with two Holsteins and one Jersey, which she received as gifts for her first three birthdays. She now is the proud owner of over 50 head, including 39 Holstein and 12 Jersey cows, heifers, and calves. At Triple H Holsteins, her family's farm where her cattle are homed, Summer assists with milking duties, calf feeding, breeding decisions, and much more to ensure that both her own and her family's herd can thrive. Summer was an active member and role model in the Barron FFA chapter, serving as chapter officer for three years, two as chapter president. She was also successful in the Employment Skills Leadership Development event and led chapter activities such as the annual fruit sale, crop show, and Food For America tour program., and was named the 2024 DeKalb Outstanding Senior for the Barron FFA Chapter. Summer is pursuing a degree in Dairy Science with a minor in Agribusiness at UW-Madison.

Week three of September, the Green Bay Packers announced that our very own, Nick Schroeder was named the Packers High School Coach of the Week.

In his second year as the varsity head coach of Barron, Schroeder had the Bears out to a perfect 5-0 start to the season. This start came after the program's 5-46 record over the past six seasons. Schroeder's leadership and shift of culture has led Barron to a mighty turnaround and has the Bears on an exciting upward trajectory. When asked about the program's turnaround, Schroeder is quick to mention his players, coaches, administration and how the ideas of family, love and community have put the Barron Bears on the winning side of football games.

"It starts with our kids. Since day one, they didn't have to believe in us [coaches], and they've bought into everything we've been preaching about being a family. Fighting for each other. Loving each other and understanding love is tough. It's not an easy thing to do to love other people. It takes risk," said Schroeder. "We also have an incredibly supportive administration and community that have had our backs since day one and have empowered not only our staff but our players to run with what we're doing and support them unconditionally."

Schroeder also mentioned the importance of community within the program's turnaround.

"Every opportunity we get, we're getting our guys out to do volunteer work. We skipped a day of fall practice to volunteer at a Special Olympics softball tournament, which was an awesome experience for our guys," said Schroeder. I think that was really a huge turning point for this team, because it showed how much bigger football is than just football, it's everybody, it's a community effort and the little things you can do to make someone's day are important."

Schroeder grew up in Oconomowoc, Wis., and attended Arrowhead High School, graduating in 2013. Schroeder played quarterback for the Warhawks under both Greg Malling and Wisconsin Football Coaches Association Hall of Fame member Tom Taraska. Schroeder went on to play quarterback at Wisconsin Lutheran College before transferring to Lakeland University and graduating in 2018. He began his coaching career in 2017 as a student assistant at Lakeland before becoming a graduate assistant in 2018. He coached for two more seasons at Lakeland as the pass game coordinator before becoming the offensive coordinator at Kettle Moraine High School for three seasons. In February of 2023, Schroeder was named the head coach of the Barron Bears. Schroeder was honored to win the Coach of the Week award but was quick to share it with his staff and players.

"It's a testament to the hard work that our players have put in on and off the field for building our culture and getting our program back on track. The same goes for our coaches. Our whole staff has been bought in and have worked night and day to get us to the point that we're at. It means the world to me that we get to be recognized for this."

Schroeder and his assistants oversee a program of 55 players with all of them suiting up for the varsity games. His staff includes Trent Nelson, Jordan Haas, Nick Mauthe, Bob Edwards and Mike Thompson. In addition to coaching, Schroeder is a long-term substitute teacher for the Barron School District. Schroeder would like to recognize his mother, Jacquie, and his grandmother, Midge, for being instrumental figures in his life.




