DESIGN KICK-OFF



We hit the ground running. Just a week after the successful referendum, we kicked off the design process with our architectural (ISG) and construction (Miron) partners.

Staff user groups were formed to provide feedback on design. The first session was held in May, and additional sessions are planned for June and July. The user group meetings provide an opportunity for staff to think "big picture" about the potential renovations to learning spaces, drive design, and provide feedback.

A focus group comprised of community members, parents, and staff was integral to finding a solution to bring to referendum. We continue to keep this group involved and convened on May 5 to share details about the design and construction process.

LITTLE HOUSE:

THE TRADITION CONTINUES



For the past 28 years in the month of February, all Barron Area School District second graders have the opportunity to read the book <u>Little House in the Big Woods</u> by Laura Ingalls Wilder. This book experience resulted in an in depth study of the life and times of a Wisconsin pioneer family, and most importantly the main character, Laura Ingalls Wilder.

In 1993, the second grade team of teachers Lynn Kolpack, Steve Sirek, Kristi Pedersen, and Carol Kettner developed the idea of a "Little House Pioneer Day". The first year was held at the American Legion Hall. The teachers

transported a TV with a VCR, and all the supplies needed for a day of round robin crafts including tin punched ornaments and soap carving. In subsequent years it was held at the dining hall at Luther Park, the education wing at First Lutheran Church, the Woodland gym, and most current activities are held in the classrooms.

Throughout the years, corresponding activities to pioneer life were tried. For example, former students were invited back to Woodland School and played the part of Laura, and performed highlights from her life. Fiddle music, dancing and singing songs have always played a part in the Little House books, so our guests to the classroom reflected that. Mrs. Pedersen's daughter's Dagny, Marta and Elsa shared fiddle music for many years. Kevin McMullin played his fiddle, told stories and acted as Pa Ingalls for many Little House days. His wife Karen Kaufman was Ma and called the dances. The physical education teachers at all three elementary schools taught the children three traditional dances.

Maynard Hoff and his family are long-time guest speakers sharing their expertise of collecting sap and making maple syrup. Roger Willis presents on hunting, trapping and furs. Former "old" school teachers shared experiences of attending school in one-room school houses.

Mrs. Waite, the Ridgeland/Dallas second grade teacher provides many projects with a pioneer theme throughout the study of the book. She has joined the Woodland students on stage for the program that is presented on the Barron Area Community Center stage, originally designed by Judy Folstad, and currently directed by Marty Pederson. Up until this past year, Mrs. Wohlk's Almena second graders experienced their own "Little House Pioneer Day" with many of the same experiences as their Woodland friends. A showcase of the three dances, and 6 songs were presented to parents in the school gym, with a day of pioneer projects following.



The whole experience is a memorable one for students in the second grade, and the history and lessons learned throughout are unforgettable.

LEARNING

Crystal (grade 2) used the stamp game to demonstrate multiplication 1342 x 3 = This material emphasizes

the need to trade 10 units in for one 10, ten tens in for one hundred and ten hundreds in for one thousand.



Maddy (grade 4) used the Golden Bead Frame to show multiplication in the millions using the equation 4,386,213 x 34 =. She knows her math facts and effortlessly solved this otherwise overwhelming math problem. This material is less concrete than those used in the younger years. Rather than counting out each bead and exchanging 10 units for a ten, she simply knows the answer is 12 so brings down 1 ten and 2 units for example. She continues in this manner until the entire equation is solved.



Jayden (grade 3) multiplied a fraction by a whole number. $3/7 \times 5 =$ The material allows her to see that her answer can easily be converted from an improper fraction to a mixed number giving her the final answer 2 1/7.

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CAREER MENTORSHIPS

There's a saying that you can't understand another person until you've walked a mile in their shoes. This adage is also true of understanding the day-to-day rewards and challenges of a person's career. Most of us have only a vague or superficial understanding of what another's job or career involves. To help students who are making course decisions and post-secondary plans for a future career, career mentorships and job shadows are available to students.

To help students as they make plans for their futures, the Mentorship Program offers career mentorships. If a student is interested in learning more about a career, a "career mentor" is found who will meet with the student to talk about their career. Questions often cover topics like educational requirements and the job outlook, but also include important discussions about the rewards and challenges of the career and advice the mentor has to offer. The student may also do a job shadow with their mentor to observe a typical day.

Career mentorships take on different forms depending on the goals of the student. Sometimes, they consist of meeting and talking about the person's career and other times a more longer-term relationship develops where the mentor makes himself or herself available to the student to support them in course selection, post-secondary plans, and simply answering questions as the student has them.

Career mentorships have been established in a wide variety of occupational areas, including social work, veterinary medicine, engineering, nursing, radiology technician, commercial real estate, ultrasound technician, and surgeon.


