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PRIDE PUMP!



Welcome to the Barron Area Education Foundation page! This page will be designated to inform our communities about the BAEF and how it is helping so many Barron Area School District students pursue their dreams.

The Barron Area Education Foundation (BAEF) awarded over \$123,000.00 dollars to help the Barron High School Class of 2022 pursue their post-secondary education dreams. Any senior who successfully completed a type-written application received at least a \$1500 award to further their education.

The Barron Area Education Foundation is happy to hold scholarships for up to two years for students who are on waiting lists, pursuing other endeavors or have special circumstances for not attending post-secondary school immediately the following year after graduation. Students must inform the BAEF of their intention to put the scholarship on hold in writing.

The BAEF also sponsors funding for district students who may be attending a camp, clinic or conference. Any educational function is supported except for athletics since it is against WIAA policy. Applications can be obtained on the district website or from any school counselor. Applications must be approved by the BAEF prior to the camp, clinic or conference.


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We would like to honor and remember two local individuals that had served the Barron community, the Barron Area School District, and the Barron Area Education Foundation.

Leonard Splett, began his service to the Barron Area School District serving on the Board of Education in the late 1980's and early 1990's. Even after Leonard no longer served as a Board Member, he continued his support of the District. Leonard always made a point of stopping at Central Office to check in to see how everyone was doing and how things were going. He always made the effort to make sure he introduced himself to any new District Administrator and to stay connected with each one throughout their years serving in the district. Leonard was also a great supporter of the Barron High School FFA Program.

The Barron Area Education Foundation (BAEF) was founded in 1992, and Leonard served with a group of people who had a vision to help students in the District by awarding scholarships as they pursued post-secondary education. He served along with Gary Borgen, Rev. Joel Helter, Robert Lentz, Robert Peterson, and Dave Vrwuink. This initial Board of Directors, along with Wayne King, served as incorporators of the BAEF, Inc. Leonard continued to serve on the BAEF Board of Directors until his passing this past February.





We would also like to remember David Barta who also served on the Barron Area Education Foundation. He served from 1996 until 2014. Dave served many years in leadership roles as President and Vice-President. In 1995, the BAEF received their tax-exempt status, and when Dave came on board in 1996, he served an especially significant role in the further development of the foundation. He worked diligently on fundraising efforts, developing important policies and procedures for the day-to-day operation of the foundation, setting criteria for selection and awarding scholarships, and procedures for scholarship payouts only to name a few. Dave also passed this past February.

Leonard and Dave will be remembered with fond memories and especially for their service to our community, school district and especially the Barron Area Education Foundation.



The Barron Area School District Mentoring Program is a school-based mentoring program for students in middle and high school. Mentoring is about building relationships of trust between a young person and an adult for the purpose of providing support, encouragement, and guidance.

The Mentor Program positively impacts student lives! Following are comments from some of the students in the program:

- Supports me and helps me make decisions
- She's fun we ride horses together
- My mentor helps me with a lot of things—presents multiple options
- Helped me with school and my senior portfolio we practiced together
- He brings me food!
- My mentor cares about me
- I enjoy the mentor program a lot. It's fun to have my mentor come see me and talk to me at lunch. It's quite enjoyable and I recommend it. I hope he will be my mentor for a long time.
- He's really nice and fun to be around.
- Easy to talk to
- She's really nice, caring, and compassionate. Always looking out for me
- Like a mom friend to me.
- Helps me see things in a different perspective a more mature perspective
- Gives me advice and helps me see when I'm doing something wrong
- Helps me do better in school

Students are matched with community volunteers who serve as mentors for their students with the purpose of providing another positive role model who listens to, supports, and advocates for the child. By being a consistent adult presence in a young person's life, mentors can offer advice, share their life experiences, and help a young person navigate challenges.

Why is she the spotlight mentor?

A mentor for three years, Bea has been an awesome sounding board, encourager, and supporter of Angeles as she prepares for her future and post-secondary education.

What Angeles says about Bea, her mentor:

She's helped me with school and my senior portfolio. I practiced my senior exposition with her and she gave me feedback and suggestions. She's like a mom friend to me. She gives me advice and helps me see when I'm doing something wrong. She tells me about how she sees things from her perspective.

What inspired you to mentor?

The Mentor Coordinator contacted me and asked if I'd be interested in mentoring a student. I previously worked in the Boys & Girls Club at BHS and I really enjoyed working with kids on that level. This was a great opportunity to work oneon-one with someone.

What is your favorite aspect of mentoring?

Aside from regular coffee shop dates, being a witness to someone's growth is rewarding. A lot can change in three years and seeing my mentee transform into the wonderful young lady she is today makes me so proud. She has her goals in mind and has a plan to pursue them.

Why do you think others should mentor?

This is such an awesome opportunity to connect with a young community member and get a different perspective on life. We get so caught up in what we know—this is a great chance for us to teach but also learn and grow ourselves. We met when it worked for both of us and often just had coffee before school. We had a lot of conversations over those three years, and I'm grateful for the experience.




