







During the Spring Election, three of our incumbent School Board Members were up for re-election. After the final results were canvassed, they took the official Oath of Office at the April School Board

Health Services

It's just about summertime here in Wisconsin! As we all know, with the warm summer sunshine comes so not pleasant pests. I'm talking about ticks and mosquitos here. But more than just bothersome, these pesky insects can spread many illnesses to people. Prevention of bites is key to staying healthy this summer.



- 1. Wear the right clothing outdoors
 - If you will be walking through the woods or tall grass, pants, long sleeves and tall socks are best. If you're not a fashionista, tuck those pants into your socks to prevent the ticks from crawling under.
 - Wear light colored clothing, so ticks are easier to spot
- 2. Avoid direct contact with ticks
 - Walk in the center of trails, away from wooded, brushy areas with tall grass.
- 3. Use repellent on skin and clothing
 - Find the right repellant for you and your family at https://www.epa.gov/insect-repellents/find-repellent-right-you
 - Always apply per manufacturer instructions
- 4. Always check for ticks after being outdoors
 - Do a full head to toe check, paying close attention to the head, ears, armpits, belly button, between legs, and behind knees
 - Showering within 2 hours of being outdoors has shown to reduce the risk of Lyme disease, it's also a good opportunity for a full body check!
 - Your risk for Lyme disease is very low if a tick has been attached for fewer than 24 hours.

If you find an attached tick, remove it as soon as possible

- With a tweezers, grasp the tick as close to the skin as possible
- Pull upward with a steady, even pressure. Avoid twisting or jerking.
- Clean the bite with warm soap and water or with rubbing alcohol.
- Watch for the following symptoms for 30 days: rash, fever, joint swelling, muscle pain, headache or fatigue.


Consider calling your health care provider after a tick bite for further instruction, in some circumstances a single dose of antibiotics may reduce your risk of Lyme disease.

Legislative Advocacy for Education

Superintendent Tremblay, along with Wisconsin the Association School Boards (WASB) representative Neihaus, time Ben spent Capitol continuing their conversations with entrusted Wisconsin legislators regarding budget priorities for education.





This past spring Superintendents Tremblay-Barron, Superintendent Dr. Dave Aslyn-Spooner and Superintendent John Groh-Spring Valley, spoke at the Joint Finance Committee (JFC) hearings, and we will all continue to advocate for education funding into the fall. Below is the testimony from Superintendent Tremblay JFC Listening Session in Minocqua.

Testimony for JFC Listening Session

April 26th Minocqua, Wisconsin

Mv Tremblay, name Diane and I ioined colleagues John Groh, am two Superintendent of Spring Valley and Dave Aslyn, Superintendent Spooner.


First, I wanted to acknowledge that we realize that education funding isn't the only item on your agenda. Our joint finance committee members have a tremendous job to do in order to understand the needs of so many, represent those diverse needs and communicate this effectively through our legislative processes as you all serve as the principal legislative committee in charge of reviewing all state appropriations and revenues. That is a huge responsibility and we are grateful for that work.

With that said, I am truly passionate about the importance of doing our best to educate every student. I believe it is pertinent to the overall success of our society and in rural schools we are the heart of our towns and our successes are our communities' success. We help drive the economy now and into the future. Our school systems in Wisconsin, whether public or private, all work diligently to serve their constituencies and give every student what they need to reach their academic potentials, regardless of what capacity they have when they enter our doors. We do our best to educate every child.

And so the main purpose of this testimony is to inform you and your office regarding the vital support and funding that is necessary to educate our youth now and in the future. We need your partnership in order to do this effectively and sustainably.

In all my years in education, I have not yet experienced the collective anticipation that myself, along with my colleagues, are having regarding the upcoming biennial budget 2023-25. We have a copy of a survey of our priorities and price tags and my colleagues and I hope you consider each of these in our upcoming biennial budget. This survey of priorities is relevant to all of our thirty-nine CESA 11 schools along with our ten Heart of the North conference schools. These priorities encompass schools from the major portions of Barron, Burnett, Dunn, St. Croix, Pepin, Pierce, Polk, Washburn, Rusk, Sawyer counties as well as portions of Buffalo, Chippewa, and Eau Claire. I anticipate that you will likely recognize similar priorities voiced for general revenue authority, Special Education reimbursement and mental health support consistently across the entire state of Wisconsin in all of the Joint Finance Committee listening sessions.

There are many reasons for this anticipation toward our next budget cycle. The main issues that have impacted our most recent budget deficits are the understandable fiscal cliffs ahead of schools and many other agencies from the one-time ESSR federal funding, high inflation and the necessary budget cuts we have made due to no revenue limit adjustment in six of the last eight years. In addition, we have not kept pace with inflation even in the recent past when inflation has been historically very low. We have included a chart that shows how this lagging has added up over the years. From the 1998-99 to the 2008-09 school year, revenue limit increase amounts were indexed for inflation and tied to changes in the Consumer Price Index. The green shows what an inflationary increase would have been. The blue shows the actual increase provided including categorical aids not just revenue limits. Finally, the red indicates the amount the blue fell short of the green, or how far the state's funding levels have lagged behind inflation.



Another recent challenge is our staff shortages which force us to contract out in order to meet these mandated services. Contracting out is a minimum of one and a half times the cost of having a certified staff member in house, which is not as effective and certainly not sustainable. We need to be able to pay competitive salaries and benefits in order to attract candidates to fill all of our vital positions.

In summary, our next biennial state budget is crucial in order for us to sustain on-going educational opportunities for our district families and larger community. Investing in the education of our youth has a tremendous impact on the direction and future success of our country. At all of our schools, we have a dedicated and passionate staff that works effectively as a team to meet our district mission. We want to see all of our students reach their dreams while making a positive impact on our world. Education is a proven way to bring hope and equity to our youth and future promise of our nation's accomplishments.

LEGISLATION ADVOCACY FOR EDUCATION

Our Board of Education Back our Bears all the way to the Capitol. This past May, they wrote a letter of support for education funding to the Joint Finance Committee and the Education Committee.

Dear Wisconsin Joint Finance Committee:

As members of the Barron Area School District Board of Education, we found Governor Evers' K -12 education state budget initiatives very interesting.

Investing over \$2.6 billion in general and categorical aids for public schools is welcoming news. Since 2008-2009 funding for schools has not kept up with inflation. We have lagged behind ever since then. Despite higher inflation each year, we have done our best to meet the basic needs of our schools and students. Recent inflation increases have made sustainability more difficult. More budget cuts will have a serious negative impact on our staff and students and communities.

As you know, like other school systems, we have also had staff shortages. Recruiting and retaining quality teachers, administrators, secretaries, bus drivers, support staff, custodians and food service personnel requires providing a competitive salary and benefits. Yearly salary increases to keep up with inflation also help to retain staff.

We have children with special education needs, children with unmet mental health needs, and an increased number of economically disadvantaged students and English Learners. We also need to improve early learning opportunities to help prepare children for their PK -12 experience. The additional costs of meeting the diverse needs of these children are important to their educational and social growth. We are determined to meet their needs, but there is only one pot of money and costs continue to inflate.

We need additional funding. We need your support to make that funding a reality for our students, staff, and area communities. We urge you to support Governor Evers' K-12 education initiatives and pass them as part of the 2023-2025 state budget.

Mentorship

The Barron Area School District has a mentorship program for students in grades five through twelve. Students are matched with community volunteers who serve as mentors for their students with the purpose of providing another positive role model who listens to, supports, and advocates for the child. By being a consistent adult presence in a young person's life, mentors can offer advice, share their life experiences, and help a young person navigate challenges.

Research shows that mentoring provides many benefits for the student with both short and long-term benefits. Young adults with a mentor are 55% less likely than their peers to skip a day of school, 46% less likely than their peers to start using illegal drugs and 27% less likely to start drinking (Public/Private Ventures study of Big Brothers Big Sisters). In addition, students who meet regularly with their mentors are more likely to participate in sports or extracurricular activities (The Mentoring Effect, 2014).

Mentoring can improve academic performance, school attendance, graduation rates, and attitudes. But, the power of a mentor runs deeper than numbers can show. Showing someone that you believe in them can truly impact a student's potential and change the direction of their life.

Any student attending Riverview Middle School or Barron High School is eligible to have a mentor. The student must agree to and want to have a mentor and his or her parents must also give their permission. Students in the program are students who may desire an additional supportive adult in their lives or may just need a little extra support and encouragement to thrive.





ESports Association (WIHSEA) Division IV State Title.

Last Spring (2022) Jon Cerney (IT) and Trent Nelson (BHS SPED Teacher) began conversations about starting an Esports Club. They wanted to share their affinity for gaming with the students and give the opportunity to students who might not belong to any extracurricular activities. We wanted to start an all-inclusive club for everyone to get involved and feel like they belong somewhere. We want to reach everyone in the school, especially those who might not fit the 'athletic mold.' The club started as a gathering for casual gaming on a couple Saturdays for the remainder of the 2021/2022 school year. Cerney and Nelson put a proposal together and sent it to the board at the end of the school year to be considered an official school organization.

We had over 40 students interested in the organization, so we knew that we wanted to grow the program not only cater to the casual gamer, but we wanted to give the students the opportunity to compete against other schools as well. We researched different organizations and ultimately decided on the Wisconsin High School Esports Association. (WIHSEA). The WIHSEA is a nonprofit organization that services high school/middle school youth and has been around since 2017. It started with one game type and 29 schools and has evolved to 6 games over 3 seasons and has over 170 member schools. We decided to try the winter season out. We got enough interest to have two different teams to represent our school in two different games, Rocket League and Fortnite. It was a trial by fire situation, but we got our bearings under us. Our Rocket League team started off shaky but we started to excel. We started off the season 0-2 and won 6 straight games; earning us the Paladin Conference Championship and a 1st round bye in the Division IV playoffs. We won our quarterfinals, best of 5 games, against Bonduel, earning a trip to State.

On Saturday March 18th, we traveled to UW-River Falls to play Racine School District Walden III (Returning Division III State Champs). We beat Walden 3 games to zero in the semis. In the Championship match, we faced WCA (Wisconsin Connections Academy). Because of our relatively new entrance, we were the clear underdogs, but it was a bestof-7 series, and we played them tough. It was a back and forth battle, and we took them into overtime on three separate occasions. It all came down to game 7 and ultimately we fell 3-2. We battled well and are so proud of the boys. It was a great experience for everyone. The players got to connect with other students around the state. At this event, there were representatives from different colleges around the state for these kids to talk to as well. Many UW colleges are starting or have started Esports clubs of their own, so it was good for our kids to see that if they have this interest, it is something that could be beneficial to them in their futures as well.

For being a new club and first year in the WIHSEA and making it to state is very exciting, and we can tell we started a buzz around the school. We had students, teachers, and family members all tuning into the live stream to watch our team. We even had teachers travel to watch us live!

We want to build on our success this year and continue it into next year and the years to come. One of our main goals is to continue to grow and provide a place for our students in the club. We play our games in Jon Cerney's office right now, and we use Jon, my, and the student's consoles. We want to try to fundraise to get our own gaming PCs to use and maybe in the future have a space for our teams to practice and call their own.
