

In January, some members of our Board of Education attended the Wisconsin Association for School Boards annual convention in Milwaukee to learn more about school governance and effective leadership strategy. We are so grateful for their dedication to our district's mission, always putting our students at the forefront of decisions while caring for our community as a whole.



Superintendent Tremblay, along with BJ Williams, Associate Dean of Workforce and Community Development from Northwood Technical College, and students from our surrounding schools presented to our legislators at the capitol the beginning of February. The group showcased all of the wonderful academic and extra-curricular opportunities that our NW public schools offer their students.

DELEGATION

Superintendent Tremblay made her annual visit to our capitol this past month. She visited the offices of thirtyfive legislators from the Joint Finance and Education Committees. The purpose of her visit was to showcase all of the amazing things that are happening in our public rural schools in Northwest Wisconsin and to show gratitude as well as the need for state financial support.

These discussions educated our State Assembly and Senate about the rigorous academic course options including college coursework offered at our schools, regular apprenticeship and career shadow opportunities, and all of the club and athletic leadership opportunities that our students delve into during their educational journey in all of our public schools.

Also in discussions, was the financial reality of the additional state support that is still needed in our schools. The amplified need for special education reimbursement and a commitment to increased revenue limit authority to keep up with the National Consumer Price Index is at the forefront of making our schools financially sustainable; this is common ground for all of the school budgets in the state of Wisconsin. If our schools don't see a greater commitment to this financial support from our state to effectively educate our kids, then the result will likely lead to an increase in operational referendums or districts being forced to make unfortunate cuts that negatively impact our students' educational journey into their futures. This partnership from the state level is crucial to our district's mission achievements. Superintendent Tremblay also presented them with a copy of our most recent newsletter and the following letter:

Legislative Priorities: Heart of the North January 30, 2024

Dear Entrusted Wisconsin Legislators,

I hope this communication finds you well. The main purpose of this communication is to reintroduce myself and to show our gratitude for your work and commitment to funding the education of our youth.

I am the current Superintendent for the Barron Area Schools in NW Wisconsin, and I am in my 31st year as an educator. I am truly passionate about the importance of doing our best to educate every student. Investing in the education of our youth has a tremendous impact on the direction and future success of our country. Our school systems in Wisconsin, whether public or private, all work diligently to serve their constituencies and give every student what they need to reach their academic potentials regardless of what capacity they have when they enter our doors. It is paramont that we have your partnership in order to do this effectively and sustainably. It is vital for our country to be second to none in this challenging global economy and this requires rigorous programs in all core subjects and extra-curricular programs so we have the ability to create high capacity, innovative leaders of tomorrow.

Next, I would like to let you know that I am truly appreciative for your work as our trusted legislator. I certainly recognize that it is a tremendous job to understand the needs of so many, represent those diverse needs and communicate this effectively through our legislative processes. I also want to say thank you for moving the needle in our current biennial budget on revenue limit which added \$325 per student and also for the increase of over 4% to get us from 27% to 31.43% this fiscal year in special education reimbursement. Our district will transfer \$2,559,299.00 this year out of our operational budget of 20 million dollars to cover mandated special education programming. This year's biennial budget provided an incremental new aid amount at \$103,971.96 due to the increased reimbursement. We are thankful for this reimbursement because it allows us not to have to take this additional amount away from our regular education, rigorous core coursework, technical education programming and extra-curricular programs.

This year our district will be running approximately a \$500,000 deficit to sustain programming for our students, so we look forward to the promise of the next biennial state budget to maintain on-going educational opportunities for our district families and larger community. We hope to see this trend continue to increase revenue limit and SPED reimbursement in the 2025-27 budget.

BASD has a dedicated and passionate staff that work effectively as a team to meet our district mission. We want to see all of our students reach their dreams while making a positive impact on our world. Education is a proven way to bring hope and equity to our youth which provides future promise of our nation's accomplishments and global competiveness as we foster the potential and ambitions of our children.

Annual BAEF Mailing to Begin in March

The BAEF will be sending out the annual fundraising mailing to Barron High School Alumni in March. Barron Area Montessori School Accepting Applications Applications for the Barron Area Montessori School are currently being accepted for the 2024-25 school year. The Primary program, ages 3-6 is accepting applications at this time. At each level, Montessori hosts a 3-year curriculum. The Children's House meets the needs of children from three years of age through the Kindergarten year. The elementary program includes grades 1-6.

Three-year-old students follow a half day schedule five days a week. Four-year-old students may attend half days or full days five days per week. Students five and older have an all day schedule, five days a week.

The Barron Area Montessori School is a charter school with no tuition. Enrollment applications are available at the Almena Elementary School office or online at http://www.barron.k12.wi.us/schools/Montessori.cfm .

Applications must be received by Tuesday, April 30th, to be considered for the 2024-25 school year. Applications received after this date will be placed on a waiting list for 2024-25 or be considered for the 2025-26 school year.
