



I truly hope this district newsletter finds you well. At our January 18th Board of Education Meeting, the Board unanimously voted to place two referendum questions on the April 6, 2021 ballot. Our residents of the Barron Area School

District will have the opportunity to vote on two questions that will address immediate needs in all of our schools. We have learned a great deal throughout this process and are excited to share our referendum plan with the community.

For well over a year, our District has been working to develop a comprehensive, long-range facility plan that ensures the classrooms and support areas meet the needs of the Barron Areas School District students and community, both today and for many years to come. This entire planning process stemmed from our 12 Pillars of Education in order to help us build a roadmap to maintain our facilities and provide appropriate and inspiring spaces for our Golden Bears.

This facilities assessment identified \$50 million of needs. Upon review of the list, our Focus Group was able to prioritize the identified needs down to about \$30 million. The community survey indicated support for a referendum for around \$25-26 million. Therefore, we used the priorities of the survey and the Focus Group to build this comprehensive referendum solution that would take our district successfully into the future.


Our referendum solution we are presenting is the result of all of the community and staff feedback. This information was then compiled to form a recommendation that we shared with the Board of Education in December.


We are in the midst of planning our information campaign with a goal to

educate all Barron Area School District residents on the needs and the proposed solutions. It is important to note that this referendum solution impacts all schools and all students.

We sincerely appreciate your positive partnership as we travel down this road of referendum together. Strong schools enhance and build upon strong communities. Our mission is to ensure that our Golden Bears reach their dreams while making positive impacts on our world.

At Barron Area School District (BASD), we want to ensure that all students reach their dreams while making a positive impact on the world. On April 6, voters in our communities will have the opportunity to vote on two referendum questions. Both questions address needs throughout our District and will provide greater student opportunities, positively impacting education and our communities for generations.

QUESTION 1

Shall the Barron Area School District, Barron and Dunn Counties, Wisconsin be authorized to issue pursuant to Chapter 67 of the Wisconsin Statutes, general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed \$24,500,000 for the public purpose of paying the cost of a district-wide school facility improvement project consisting of: capital maintenance, safety, security and site improvements; classroom and extracurricular learning space updates, including construction of additions at the High School and Woodland Elementary School; and acquisition of furnishings, fixtures and equipment?

OUESTION 2

Shall the Barron Area School District, Barron and Dunn Counties, Wisconsin be authorized to issue pursuant to Chapter 67 of the Wisconsin Statutes, general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed \$1,900,000 for the public purpose of paying the cost of construction of an addition at Woodland Elementary School for a child care center, and acquisition of furnishings, fixtures and equipment?

WHY TWO DUESTIONS?

In the community-wide survey, respondents indicated support for adding child care space. Strategically, separate questions were created: one to focus on facility and educational needs, and the other to provide a community service. This gives residents the opportunity to learn more and vote on each question independently.

COMMUNITY SOLUTION

The District was committed to finding a solution that reflects the priorities of the taxpayers, meets the needs of our District, and impacts all buildings. To do this, a Focus Group comprised of community members, parents, and staff was formed to identify needs and explore solutions. In October, all District residents had the opportunity to provide feedback through a community-wide survey. All community feedback was instrumental in shaping the referendum plan that the Board of Education unanimously supported. The plan is focused on:

- Challenge: Continue to provide the safest possible buildings for our students.
- Solution:
 - Modify school entrances to better control visitor access
 - Improve traffic flow to increase student safety
 - Make Americans with Disabilities (ADA) improvements
 - Update obsolete life safety systems (i.e., fire alarm and emergency lighting)
- Challenge: Education has changed significantly in the past 60 years. Our schools need spaces to effectively facilitate college and career

readiness with thoughtful

regard to the nation's

current job market.

- Solution: Updates to targeted education spaces to provide learning opportunities for all students to achieve their highest potential and succeed in their chosen field.
- Challenge: Many of our schools are more than 60 years old and require significant infrastructure upgrades (i.e., mechanical systems and exterior building components).
- Solution: Upgrade inefficient building systems to better control learning environments and make exterior building repairs to protect our investment in our schools.
- Challenge: A Barron

 Development
 Corporation survey
 indicated there is a clear
 need for additional child
 care in our community.
 Due to the shortage,
 families enroll in other
 school systems that
 provide child care
 services.
- Solution: The District would partner with local child care centers to create a facility at Woodland Elementary to serve our families.

I wish I could go back into the past,


