#### SEASON OF 1925

When the call for candidates was issued the day following the opening of school, there were but seven men from last year's squad, Captain Jensen, Schiefelbein, Soderberg, Stebbins, Kahl, Wolworth, and Rockman. The other men who completed the squad were McDonald, Warwick, Borgen, Horman, Post, Coon, Luer, and Ludvigson.

Under the coaching of Mr. Short and the leadership of Captain Jensen, the squad rapidly rounded into form. The season, which was to be the most successful since football was started in the fall of 1923, was begun at Rice Lake, Sept. 26, after three weeks of hard practice.

## BARRON-7 RICE LAKE-7

We opened the 1925 season at Rice Lake and the game resulted in a 7-7 tie. The game was played in a drizzling rain and fumbles were frequent on both sides. Although outweighed, we were not out-played or out-fought. During the first half, our line failed to function and Rice Lake hammered their way down the field, Secore going over for their counter. Chandler proceeded to kick goal. Undaunted, we fought hard, and, aided by a fifteen vard penalty, we went down the field. After an unsuccessful thrust at the line. Captain Jensen went around end for fifteen yards and a touchdown. Schiefelbein kicked goal. We fought vainly to break the tie and when the whistle blew, the score stood at 7-7.

# BARRON-35 CUMBERLAND-7

The Rice Lake game showed up the rough spots, and after a week of hard practice we met Cumberland on our field and set them down to the tune of 35-7. Again we were out-weighed but Cumberland could not cope with our speedy attack and we were able to carry the ball over for five touchdowns. Each time Schiefelbein kicked goal. On the first down Youngman crashed over for their lone counter and their try for goal was successful. In the third quarter Soderberg was thrown hard, breaking several ribs and keeping him from the game.

On Oct. 30 we journeyed to Osceola for our fifth game which resulted in a scoreless tie. Just before the game Kahl was injured, making it necessary for Borgen to take his place in the backfield. It was probably the cleanest game of the season and although we gained no more points than our opponents, it can be said that we out-played them but lacked the scoring punch.

#### BARRON-20 AMERY-18

Friday, November 6, we journeyed to Amery to play our sixth and most thrilling game of the season. As we supposed it was our last game, we were determined to win. At the end of the first half Amery had scored 12 points and we had failed to even threaten their goal but with the determination to win, we came back and in the second half, Captain Jensen took a pass from Schiefelbein and raced over the goal line.
