# Football Games of '47

### Cumberland, We—13, They—6

September 19, the "Bear's" football team started out in a blaze of glory by defeating the "Beavers" 13 to 6.

In the first quarter, Cumberland made the first threat, when Davis went over for a touchdown. The second quarter was uneventful, until Faanes broke through for a 73-yard paydirt run, Schmidt making the extra point. Near the end of the quarter, Faanes went across again to make the score 13 to 6. There was no scoring during the last half.

## Rice Lake, We-0, They-27

Barron traveled to Rice Lake on September 26 for its first and biggest defeat of the season by a score of 27-0.

The first half ended, 14-0, the "Bears" not threatening once. During the last half, Rice Lake scored twice while Barron threatened but once.

#### Spooner, We—19, They—6

On October 3, Barron defeated Spooner on the home field by a score of 19-6. The first quarter ended scoreless; the second quarter, Faanes pushed over for the "Bear's" first touchdown, Schmidt making the extra point.
