

Barron suffered its first defeat, Sept. 16, at Bloomer by a score of 13 to 0. The biggest factor in producing the defeat was lack of experience.

The second encounter with Cumberland at the Barron Memorial Field showed a much better organized squad, both offensively and defensively. Har Rogers managed to struggle across for pay dirt in the first quarter. Turgeson made the extra point good, which left the half time score at 7-0. Again in the third period Barron bulled its way across the six point line. The game ended, 14-0.

On Sept. 30 Barron traveled to Hayward for a day game and defeated them 16-0. In the second quarter Rogers went over from the three yard line. In the last minutes of the third quarter Bob Ritchie called on Turgeson to try his toe for a field goal from the 30 yard line. The kick was good. A completed pass to Jorstad in the final lap sent him over for another T.D. Turgeson kicked the point after.

The second defeat came Oct. 7, when the Ladysmith Lumberjacks, who were conference champions, journeyed here to win by a small margin of 6-0. The first half was a thriller with neither team scoring. Ladysmith fought her way into scoring distance during the fourth quarter.

On Oct. 14, the Bears took a disheartening 8-6 defeat from the Warriors. Rice Lake made their touchdown early in the second quarter. In the early part of the fourth period Barron was downed behind their own goal giving the Warriors two more points. In the last minutes of the game Jorstad passed a long one to Rogers who ran it over for Barron's only touchdown.

Spooner came to Barron on Oct. 2 to try and upset the Bear's homecoming and were turned back with a defeat of 15-0. In the first quarter the Bears marched up to the one yard line; and after several attempts, Rogers barged over the goal line. No extra point was made. In the third quarter Rogers ran 27 yards for another T.D. and McDonald ran over for the extra point. The Bears collected two more points after tackling one of the Spooner players behind their own goal line.




Bob Koser, who was elected captain, led the Bears throughout the 49-50 season with much enthusiasm.
