### EAGLES EDGE BARRON

The first game of the season for the Bears was a nonconference match with Unity. Barron's offensive game was very good but the defensive team couldn't hold the Eagles' single wing attack and Unity won 20-19. Early in the game George Clausen hit Jim Sevals for 20 yards. After a few plays, Clausen rolled over from the one yard line. Al Sinclair carried over the extra point for a 7-0 Then the Unity Eagles turned the tables with a touchdown by Dube and an extra point by the same man. Late in the second half, Clausen and Sevals united in passcatching brilliance for a 65 yard touchdown. The extra point attempt failed, but Barron led 13-7. The Eagles came back in the third quarter with two touchdowns and one extra point. In the final quarter fullback Jerry Jerome scored a much needed touchdown. The Bears' point attempt was again stopped to force a loss of 20-19.

### RAILROADERS SQUEEZE BY BEARS

The Railroaders of Spooner, at their home field, squeezed by the Bears by the score of 6-0. The only score

was made by Grover in the fourth quarter when he plunged over the goal from the two yard line. Late in the last period, Barron started passing to hit goal territory. George Clausen let fly with a pass completed to Mike Severson for eight yards. The next attempt hit Jim Sevals at the 50 and went out of bounds at the 48. The play covered 19 big yards. Another aerial was attempted, this one deflected by a Spooner lineman and picked off by Grover of Spooner. A few plays later the gun was sounded for the end of the game.

### BEARS BEGIN TO MOVE

The Bears, after one tough conference loss, came to the field opposing the Cumberland Beavers. Jim Link was the night's star, scoring all three of Barron's touchdowns on runs of 74, 23, and 2 yards. Al Sinclair thrilled the crowd with a brilliant 52 yard return of a kickoff. Ends Charles Husby and Jim Sevals also added much to the victory with key receptions. Leading 13-6 at half-time the Bears made the lead stick winning 20-19 over Cumberland.

### HOMECOMING VICTORY OVER HAYWARD

This made the score 18 to 6 in the Bears' favor. Hayward scored another touchdown midway in the fourth quarter.

Barron's first touchdown in the first quarter came on a 25 yard pass from George Clausen to Jim Sevals and the extra point was kicked by Gary Borgen. As half-time rolled around, the score didn't look the best for the Bears as they were behind 13 to 7. However, they began to move late in the third

quarter on a drive from their own 45 yard line. Clausen hit Sevals for the touchdown with a 7 yard pass and the extra point was good. Bloomer came back strong and scored on a five yard run making the score 20 to 14 in their favor. Barron received the ball with four minutes left and 67 yards to go. After a long drive, Borgen carried the ball over from the 3 yard line tieing the score. He then kicked the extra point making the score 21 to 20 in the Bears' favor. With less than two minutes left, Sevals intercepted a Bloomer pass and prevented their scoring again.

#### THEY COME CLOSE



Chetek scored once more and as the game ended, the scoreboard read Chetek 26, Barron 13.

The Bears were defeated by a strong team from rival Rice Lake. The Bears, unable to get a sustained drive under way, found Rice Lake's defense strong. Barron started out strong with Jim Link going 15 yards on the first play from scrimmage. A few plays later Barron fumbled and Rice Lake went in for the score. The Bears found it hard to overcome Rice Lake's powerful ground attack and the game ended with Rice Lake defeating Barron 40-6.

### THE BEARS MEET THE LEADERS

The Ladysmith Lumberjacks extended their Heart of the North football crown to two straight years of undefeated games. In the second quarter the Bears, running from a single wing, scored as Charlie Husby ran over from the 1 yard line. This was the end of scoring for Barron, although Ladysmith ran up more points. The final score was Ladysmith 55, Barron 13.

# Co-Captains


